The CDC and the FDA are recommending a pause in the use of the Johnson & Johnson (J&J) COVID-19 vaccine to allow researchers at both agencies time to better understand a small number of reported cases of women developing a rare clotting disorder after receiving the vaccine. Addressing the Digital Divide – April 15, 2021, 3:00 pm ET

The COVID pandemic has shined a light on the crucial need for connectivity and the challenges that many communities and individuals face in securing access and paying for it. **Funding Announcement - National Initiative to Address COVID-19 Health Disparities Among Populations at High-Risk and Underserved Communities, Including Racial and Ethnic Minority Populations and Rural Communities.** Funded through the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, this grant opportunity will provide grants to public health departments to improve testing and contact tracing capabilities; develop innovative mitigation and prevention resources and services; improve data collection and reporting; build, leverage, and expand infrastructure support; and mobilize partners and collaborators to advance health equity and address social determinants of health as they relate to COVID-19. Funding is expected to be awarded to up to 108 state, local, territorial, and freely associated state health departments, or their bona fide agents. ### **Considerations for Vaccine Mandates**

The Kaiser Family Foundation (KFF) has recently released**a new brief** that explains the legal basis for vaccine mandates and the applicable limitations. The KFF COVID-19 Vaccine Monitor indicates that 7% of the population would only get a vaccine if it was required. While no states have a vaccine mandate in place, some employers have instituted vaccine mandates. These employers include health care settings, universities and colleges.

### New Infographics Highlight Role of Pharmacists and Community Health Workers with COVID-19 Vaccine Access

New infographics developed by the National Institute for Health Care Management (NIHCM) highlight the value of pharmacists and community health workers. **The pharmacist infographic** notes how trusted and accessible pharmacists are, with 90% of Americans living within five miles of a pharmacy. They are also well-positioned to support vaccine distribution and promote equitable access. **The CHW workforce infographic** highlights how trusted and diverse CHWs are, and how they can help address determinants of poor health in their communities. They also have the skills to strengthen the impact of the COVID-19 vaccination efforts.

### New CDC Webpages Focused on Adult Day Service Centers

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has recently released two new web pages with guidance for Adult Day Service Centers (ADSC). The <u>Guidance for Adult</u> <u>Day Services Centers</u> page provides administrators and staff of ADSCs with guidance to prevent the spread of COVID-19 within their facilities. The <u>Participants at Adult Day</u> <u>Services Centers and Their Caregivers</u> page includes strategies for ADSC participants and their caregivers to protect themselves and their loved ones reduce the spread of COVID-19.

### **Fact Sheet Highlights Vaccine Access**

Several aging and disability groups partnered to develop a guide to making vaccination sites fully accessible to older adults and people with disabilities. The **recommendations included in the fact sheet** note that addressing significant gaps in accessibility of vaccine administration sites can aid in increasing vaccination rates in vulnerable populations.

# Communities Leverage Partnership with Colleges and Universities to Distribute Vaccines

Temple University's College of Public Health recently collaborated with the Philadelphia Housing Authority to distribute COVID-19 vaccines. Through this **long-standing partnership** they were able to vaccinate essential workers and high-risk populations in public housing. They set up clinics led by Temple faculty and full trained nursing student volunteers in public housing sites across Philadelphia.

### New CDC Initiative to Address Racism in Health

Dr. Rochelle Wolensky, the new director of the CDC, recently announced that<u>a new</u> <u>agency-wide initiative called Racism and Health</u> will refocus the CDC's public health efforts on recognizing, acknowledging, and taking action on the impact of race on people's health. Dr. Wolensky has charged all of the centers and offices under the CDC to develop interventions and health outcomes to address racism in their respective areas.

### New Resource Highlights Role of Community Health Workers

The Alzheimer's Association recently released a new resource guide for health departments to learn about community health workers (CHW) and how CHWs can help them address the needs of older adults and the related challenges of dementia. The <u>Community</u> <u>Health Workers: A Resource for Healthy Aging and Addressing Dementia</u> contains the following sections: training and continuing education about healthy aging for

CHWs, training for CHWs regarding Alzheimer's, foundational resources for and about CHWs, a sample patient navigation pipeline that can integrate CHWs and sample CHW-led interventions with a demonstrated impact on healthy aging in place.

### The Role of Area Agencies on Aging in Supporting Older Adults in Rural Communities

A new data brief from the National Association of Area Agencies on Aging (n4A) highlights key data from the 2019 Area Agency on Aging (AAA) National Survey on AAAs serving rural areas. The brief focuses on the differences and similarities between AAAs serving rural and urban areas with regards to their structure, budget, workforce and service provision, including home repair and modification, transportation and evidencebased programs. Some of the key findings are that AAAs in rural areas:

- Are more likely to administer their local State Health Insurance Assistance Program than AAAs serving non-rural areas;
- Are more likely to be part of a council of governments or regional planning and development agency than AAAs serving non-rural areas; and
- Have lower median budgets and fewer median full-time staff than AAAs serving non-rural areas.

### New Alzheimer's Website from National Institute on Aging (NIA)

The NIA has launched a **<u>new website</u>** designed to educate and support people impacted by Alzheimer's disease and related dementias including people living with dementia, caregivers, health care professionals, researchers, and advocates. Some of the website features include:

- Resources for community and public health workers, health care providers, and researchers
- Information about Alzheimer's disease and related dementias
- Tips and resources for caregivers and people living with dementia
- Current clinical trials and studies people can join to help treat and prevent dementia
- Updates on what the federal government is doing to address Alzheimer's and related dementias

### **Primer for Community-Based Services for Older Adults with Disabilities** Justice in Aging has released a**primer** that offers an overview of Medicaid Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) that includes how different states serve older adults with disabilities in their communities. This resources also addresses population-based inequities in the HCBS system.

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
