## **Operationalizing Equity Supplement**



## **Strategies and Resources to Operationalize Equity**

<u>Health equity</u> occurs when everyone has a fair and just opportunity to be as healthy as possible in a society that values each member equally through focused and ongoing efforts to address avoidable inequities, historical and contemporary injustices, and the elimination of disparities in health and healthcare.

To achieve health equity, we must change the *policies and systems* that have resulted in the generational injustices that give rise to health disparities related to race, ethnicity, ability, and other factors. This is a large and complex issue and should be addressed in coordination with other equity efforts.

For those who want to explore and identify ways to improve health equity among older adults in your communities, this supplement contains several resources and examples that you can consider as you complete the modules. The strategies included in this supplement are not exhaustive but are meant to stimulate thinking and action to improve health equity for older adults in your jurisdiction.
